Data from
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Toyota's Cho Sees Changes

Toyota President Fujio Cho recently discussed hybrids and major changes in the global automotive outlook during the opening of a new Australian headquarters in Port Melbourne. Although Cho expects global vehicle demand to be strong in the long term due to growth in China, India, Eastern Europe and Russia, he sees a few obstacles, according to Australia's new.com.au.

Production of hybrid gasoline/electric-powered vehicles has reached 5% of output, but Cho said Toyota's target of 20% to 30% by 2010 may be overly optimistic and will depend on capacity. He also said that unless there is a major change in the global oil market, it will be impossible to achieve long-term sales growth without hybrids. Already China's increased demand has been a factor in higher oil prices. Cho expressed surprise at recent oil price rises, but said rises are driven more by events in the market and the Middle East than by demand in China. He said the dramatic growth in hybrid vehicle production will take the pressure off future oil demand, but it will swing the emphasis to demand for copper and electricity. But pressure from oil prices may be the biggest driver of the technology. Currently, all of Toyota's hybrid production is in Japan.

Bagle Virus Wreaking Havoc

Now that we have your attention... Yet another major computer virus is infecting PCs worldwide via the Internet. This one is a mass-mailing virus – variously dubbed Bagle.ab, Bagle.ac, Bagle.af, Beagle.ag and Bagle.ai – by different security firms. This type of virus, known as a worm, works by opening a path for intruders to relay bulk e-mail messages through the infected computer and attempts to contact one of almost 150 German Web sites to let the attackers know of their latest conquest.

It resembles the first worm in the

Bagle line that started infecting computers in January. What makes this one so difficult to fight is the large number of variations. What makes this one so difficult to fight is the large number of variations, requiring anti-virus software makers to tailor their "vaccine" to each variation.

Bagle arrives in email as an attachment and infects computers running the Windows operating system (not LINUX, UNIX or Macs) – but only if the user opens the attachment. Worse still, the program attempts to halt more than 250 security applications from running on the computer, then mails itself to any email address it can find on the computer, and contacts one of those German Web sites. Because Bagle does not render the computer inoperable, the user may not even realize they are infected.

Most anti-virus software makers have published updates to detect and remove the worm. There is also a free program that does the same thing called Stinger.exe from download.nai.com. If you think you may be infected, contact your network administrator or install anti-virus software. But the most important lesson to learn from this is: Do not trust email attachments from people you do not know or messages that look suspicious, even from people you do know. That's why worms continue to be a threat; they depend on our tendency to trust what we should not. **When in doubt, delete suspicious messages or attachments without opening them.** Otherwise, your PC may be the next one infected.
